

Coaching Boys Into Men (CBIM)

Regional Training



One in three adolescents report knowing a friend who has been physically hurt by their dating partner. **Coaching Boys into Men** helps build healthy relationships and prevent dating violence before it starts.

Coaching Boys Into Men (CBIM) is a national program that trains athletic coaches to use their influence to help high school male student athletes to build healthy relationships and prevent sexual and dating violence. Over the course of an athletic season, CBIM coaches lead their players through brief weekly activities that address things such as personal responsibility, respectful behaviors, and relationship abuse. Topics covered each week include insulting language, disrespectful behavior, digital abuse, and what it means to 'be a man'. Coaching Boys Into Men was created by Futures Without Violence in 2001.

As a result of this training, athletic coaches will:

- better understand their role as a coach in influencing how young men treat women & girls,
- recognize 'teachable moments' when they occur,
- and leave the training with the knowledge and tools to begin implementing the CBIM program.
