# IMPACT ON THE SURVIVOR

SURVIVOR'S RIGHTS	VS	NEGATIVE IMPACT
To be treated with dignity and respect		Victim-blaming attitudes
To choose a course of action in dealing with the violence		Feeling powerless
To privacy and confidentiality		Shame and stigma
To non-discrimination		Discrimination on the basis of gender, ethnicity, etc
To comprehensive information to help make her own decision		Being told what to do Increased risk of revictimization/abuse




#### THE PURPOSE

- Return power & control to the survivor
- Minimize secondary victimization



#### **POWER & CONTROL**





### SECONDARY VICTIMIZATION

Many survivors who disclose their assault to others experience secondary victimization. Secondary trauma occurs when survivors seek assistance from medical, legal or healthcare professionals, but these professionals often exhibit and use victim-blaming behaviors. Contact with many services especially those which do not specialize in sexual assault traumatization, can increase survivors' psychological and physical distress.




### CHALLENGES OF THIS APPROACH

- Patience
- Reserving judgment
- Acknowledging our own biases and trauma



### REDIRECTION WHEN WE ARE STRUGGLING







#### **DEBRIEF**

- Survivor: What did that experience feel like for you?
- Observers: What did it look like to you? How did it feel to observe that?
- Other Participants: What biases/perspectives were your characters bringing with them? Why do you think they said what they did?
- How did it feel to say that to the survivor?
- How could your character have responded instead?

We have the opportunity to either cause further harm, or to facilitate healing.

Thank you for telling me.

I'm sorry this happened to you.

You are not alone.

It's not your fault.

You're safe now.

My biggest concern is your safety.

How can I help?

Would you like to hear about some of the options you have?

I support whatever choices you make.

- Respect their bravery for showing up
- Be a human being with them
